The meeting of the St. Louis Labor Council was called to order by President Robert Soutier at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 15, 2008.

President Soutier led the delegates in the invocation, followed by the pledge of allegiance to our country's flag.

A motion was made, seconded and approved to accept the June 17, 2008 meeting minutes as printed. Copies of the minutes were available at the entrance of the room.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS

President Soutier called upon John Ebeling to read the Executive Board report as follows:

Also present were Marcia Cline, United Way of Greater St. Louis, and Ed Finkelstein, Labor Tribune and Tom Newport, CWA.

President Soutier introduced Tom Newport who gave a presentation about AT&T Wireless, the only union wireless phone company.

Board member, Tony Ellebracht, President CWA, Local #6310 introduced a resolution that would ask affiliates to switch their wireless service to AT&T. The resolution is as follows:

**Urging City and State Governments to Switch
Wireless Service to Unionized Providers**

WHEREAS, it is imperative that state and local governments patronize companies that adhere to the highest standards of corporate citizenship;

WHEREAS, state and local governments around the country are significant institutional customers and have both the ability and responsibility to choose to do business with companies that respect workers' rights to collectively bargain;

WHEREAS, state and local governments, on behalf of the working men and women they represent, should support unionized companies like AT&T, formerly Cingular Wireless which is the only union wireless vendor in the country;

WHEREAS, the telecommunications industry is one of the most visible and dynamic industries in the world, and the more attention we can bring to the success story of AT&T the better;

WHEREAS, it would be a tremendous boost for our members and their families if state governments make it a priority to do business with companies like AT&T;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Greater St. Louis Labor Council and its affiliates fully commit to:

1. Switch wireless service for professional use to AT&T to support a unionized company and its workers and also save money through an 18% per month discount for unions and union employees and their families;
2. Reach out to city and state government officials to encourage them to switch governmental contracts for wireless service to AT&T; and

3. Inform our membership about this campaign and encourage them to switch cell phone service and advise them of the 10% discount available to union members at AT&T through Union Privilege.

A motion was made, seconded and approved to support the resolution.

President Soutier stated that the Council will send a letter to all affiliates asking for support of CWA workers.

President Soutier reminded the Board members about the Labor Day Parade and the theme of "Turn Around America."

Soutier stated that the parade line-up drawing will be held at the delegate meeting to be held next week on Thursday, July 15, 2008 at IBEW, Local #1 Hall.

Soutier also spoke about the retirement party for John Clark to be held prior to the delegate meeting, and urged all to attend.

President Soutier advised the Board that a letter from Show-me Aquatics has been received that grants neutrality for organizing at the proposed community center.

Jim Dougherty, President UFCW, Local #655 asked if the letter goes far enough and asked Ed Finkelstein to request a clarification from Show-Me Aquatics.

President Soutier stated that affiliate letters have been sent out, but the letters to union members will be held up until those questions have been answered.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the recommendations from the Labor Clubs.

President Soutier reminded the Board members about the Labor “Tug-of-War to be held on Saturday, September 27, 2008.

Soutier advised the Board that raffle tickets for “Pulling for Jay” are in the office and that the Labor Clubs will help sell the tickets.

Nancy Cross, Vice President SEIU, Local #1 MO Division, submitted a resolution to be sent to the AFL-CIO National on raiding. The resolution is as follows:

RESOLUTION ON RAIDING AND ORGANIZING INTERFERENCE

As union members and leaders, we are committed to building a powerful voice for workers on the job, in the economy, and in political and legislative venues.

No matter what our union affiliation, we are united around our shared goals of building a stronger labor movement and a better future for all working families.

When only 8% of private sector workers are organized, we believe raiding other unions and interfering in other unions’ organizing campaigns are a waste of precious resources and serve only to divide workers at the worst possible time.

Now is the time to unite workers, not divide them. A huge opportunity lies just around the corner to elect a pro-workers president, win universal health care, and achieve the freedom to form a union for all workers.

Raiding other sister unions and interfering in their organizing campaigns run directly counter to time honored trade union principles. The very purpose of state and local central labor bodies is to foster cooperation

among all participating unions and speaking with one voice so that we are able to unite our strength to achieve economic justice for workers and their families.

Unions that fail to adhere to these bedrock principles have failed to live up to the basic requirements of cooperation and solidarity that form the basic tenets of the central body.

THEREFORE: BE IT RESOLVED:

I. DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of this resolution, the term “established collective bargaining relationship” shall be given the same meaning and application as that term is defined in Article XX of the AFL-CIO Constitution, including determinations rendered under Article XX, (1) by the Impartial Umpires or (2) in appeal decisions and policy statements issued by the AFL-CIO Executive Council, except that “established collective bargaining relationships” shall not include members-only arrangements. “Members-only” means a situation in which a union has achieved a limited form of recognition, but has not been certified or recognized as the sole, exclusive, or majority representative of an employee group by an employer or a certifying agency. The term “member unions” as used in the Resolution shall include all members of this central body, including unions that participate by virtue of their receipt of a Solidarity Charter from the AFL-CIO.

II. NO RAIDING

No member union of this central body shall attempt to raid, decertify or otherwise terminate the established collective bargaining relationship of any other member union during the term of this Agreement. Where a member union currently represents workers in an established collective bargaining relationship, no other member union shall make any effort to become the bargaining representative or to de-authorize any other member union’s representation rights. If any member union is approached by workers expressing an interest in changing representatives, it shall inform the workers of this Resolution and encourage them to work within their existing union structure to resolve their concerns.

III. NO INTERFERENCE IN ORGANIZING CAMPAIGNS

No member union of this central body shall interfere in the organizing campaign of another member union of this central body.

IV. NO INDIRECT RAIDING OR INTERFERENCE

All member unions agree that they will not seek to accomplish indirectly that which they cannot do directly under the terms of this Resolution. In this context, no member union will encourage or support an allied organization (or any third party) with respect to any activity (or threatened activity) that if taken by any member union would violate this Resolution. Nor will any member union seek to benefit from any such activity undertaken by an allied organization or third party. Nothing in this Resolution shall be interpreted to preclude one member union from seeking to represent a unit in which another member union was decertified if the union seeking representation rights did not participate or assist in any way, either directly or indirectly, in the decertification.

V. ENFORCEMENT

Any member union that violates a provision of this Resolution shall be expelled from this central body.

VI. SOLICARITY CHARTERS

This central body strongly urges the Executive Council of the AFL-CIO to revise the language of all Solidarity Charters to include full protection for all unions that are issued such charters under the provisions of Article XX of the AFL-CIO Constitution, which requires respect for established collective bargaining relationships, and under the provisions of Article XXI of the AFL-CIO Constitution and all other policies, programs and determinations of the AFL-CIO Executive Council regulating organizing competition among affiliates.

A motion was made, seconded and approved to support the resolution.

A suggestion was made to provide a link on the Labor Council website to the various Labor Clubs so that information can be shared.

Marcia Cline, United Way of Greater St. Louis advised the Board that a kick-off of the 2008 United Way Campaign will be held on September 19, 2008 at the Olin Trap Shooting Range in East Alton, IL.

Marcia also reminded the Board about the School for Women Workers' opening program and reception July 10, 2008 at 6:00 p.m.

Ed Finkelstein spoke about the Labor Triune.

With nothing further to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

PLEASE NOTE: The two Resolutions were read by President Soutier as a Special Order of Business in an abbreviated form.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve both Resolutions as stated in the above Executive Board minutes.

President Soutier announced that the theme of this year's Labor Day Parade would be "Turn Around America" and that this theme was decided upon by the National AFL-CIO. This theme will continue from Labor Day through the November election.

Soutier spoke about the up-coming "Tug-of-War" event scheduled to be held in Forest Park by the tennis courts on Saturday, July 27, 2008. The event is sponsored by the Labor Clubs and the proceeds will go to the Shriner's Hospital. There will be food and drink available and a lot of fun for the entire family.

President Soutier also announced that the Labor Clubs will be selling raffle tickets in conjunction with the tug-of-war. The topic will be "Pulling for Jay". There will be 5,000 raffle tickets sold at a cost of \$5 each. Five drawings for \$1,000 each will be made and the remaining \$20,000 will be given to the Jay Nixon campaign.

Soutier urged everyone to get involved in this fun day at the park by either putting in a team for the tug-of-war or attending with their friends and family.

President Soutier also mentioned the Labor Walks that are taking place through the St. Louis Labor Council and suggested that anyone wishing to volunteer contact Mary Ellen Ponder at the Labor Council office at 314-291-8666.
